GOP House candidate says AIDS is punishment for sin of homosexuality

When the Bible says homosexuals should be "put to death; their blood shall be upon them," the blood is really AIDS. Or so says Jeremy Walters, Republican legislative hopeful, in a series of posts on his Facebook

Waters is running in House District 67 against state Rep. Kevin McCarthy, D-Des Moines, the second highest ranking Democrat in the Iowa House.

From Walters' Facebook:

Jeremy Walters The Holy Bible say if your "GAY" homosexual they shall surely be put to death; their blood shall be upon them. This tells me a lot so should we kill them NO. They Need to ask God to forgive them of their sins and mean it turn away from it. They also need to know that when it says that their blood shall be upon them that tells me it is AIDS. That's how I feel. August 12 at 9:45

Jeremy Walters homosexual "GAY" is not of God!!!! In the Bible it reads; Leviticus 20:13 - King James Bible

If a man also lie with mankind, as he lieth with a women, both of them have committed an abomination; they shall surely be put to death; their blood shall be upon them. On his campaign website, Walters makes no mention of same-sex marriage or gay rights at all, focusing instead on economic issues like property taxes, the estate tax and the state budget, as well as gun rights and education. He has previously run three times in three different legislative districts, most recently losing to Democrat Geri Huser in House District 42 by more than 20 percentage points in 2004 and in the GOP primary in House District 62 in 2008. He later served as a precinct chair for Texas Congressman Ron Paul's 2008 Iowa Caucus campaign.

There are four times as many registered Democrats than Republicans in HD67, according to the Iowa Secretary of State's office.

Walters could not be immediately reached for comment.

lowa GOP denounces controversial comments on AIDS, homosexuality (UPDATED)

Statements by a Republican candidate for the Iowa House that AIDS is punishment for the sin of homosexuality have been officially denounced by Republican Party of Iowa Chairman Matt Strawn.

In a series of posts on his Facebook page, House District 67 candidate Jeremy Walters pointed to passages in the Bible that say homosexuals should be "put to death; their blood shall be upon them." Walters said the blood is really AIDS. The state's larges LGBT-rights group, One Iowa, immediately called for the Iowa GOP to disavow the comments.

"Mr. Walters' comments are inappropriate and in no way represent the beliefs of the Republican Party of Iowa," Strawn said in a statement to The Iowa Independent. "HIV/AIDS does not discriminate and our hearts and prayers go out to any Iowa family facing this disease."

Walters told The Des Moines Register that he has no plans to remove the posting from his Facebook page, saying it's only offensive to gay rights advocates, "because they know it's the truth. Truth does hurt." Walters also said he will be meeting people at the Republican Party of Iowa's booth at the Iowa State Fair Thursday from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. It's unclear if Strawn's statement changes those plans.

UPDATE at 6:20 p.m.: Republican Party of Iowa Communications Director Danielle Plogmann says in a statement to The Iowa Independent that Walters will no longer be participating in the party's Iowa State Fair booth.

"We just learned Mr. Walters had previously signed up to work the booth as a Polk County volunteer," she said. "This is no longer the case."

UPDATE at 6:50 p.m.: Despite his assurances that the Facebook statements would not be removed, Walters has taken down the posts referring to homosexuality and AIDS.

GOP candidate apologizes for anti-gay statements

In an e-mail to The Iowa Independent, Republican legislative hopefulJeremy Walters said he regrets the controversial Facebook postings regarding AIDS being a punishment from God for homosexuality and has removed them from the site.

Walters, who is challenging incumbent Democratic state Rep. Kevin McCarthy of Des Moines in House District 67, last week wrote that when the Bible says homosexuals should be "put to death; their blood shall be upon them," the blood is really AIDS. When the statements were made public they were greeted with outrage by One Iowa, the state's largest LGBT-rights group, and denounced by Republican Party of Iowa Chairman Matt Strawn. When the party later discovered Walters was scheduled to volunteer at the GOP Iowa State Fair booth, his invitation was rescinded.

Despite initially saying he would not remove the postings from his Facebook page, Walters had a change of heart and took them down. He has also changed his privacy settings so that the public can no longer see what he posts.

Walters' statement to The Iowa Independent:

I am not against people having a gay lifestyle, and the statements made on Facebook have been taken the wrong way. The statement regarding gay homosexuality was not meant to be offensive and I deeply appologize.

As far as the quote from Bible; I was replying to someone elses post. It should have been posted as a comment on their page, not my Facebook wall. I appologize for the mistake and if this statement offened anyone. Both postings have been removed and these comments do not pertain to my campaign or the Republican Party of Iowa. My passion is to listen and learn from the people so I can represent them at the statehouse. Everyone makes mistakes, please forgive me.

Jeremy's statement *may have been* theologically clumsy, but it seemed close enough to Biblical truth to not merit a censure from the Republican party. GOP head Matt Strawn is right in saying HIV does not discriminate; in other words, the fact that someone has HIV by no means proves they got it through sodomy. But I don't see that that is what Jeremy said.

Jeremy, perhaps imprecisely, alleged a connection between HIV and sodomy. Romans 1:27 has been for centuries interpreted as making this connection. Everyone knows there is this connection. Everyone knows sodomites suffer it far more than the rest of the population, and that sodomy's practices, which are so embarrasingly unsanitary that you dare not detail them in one of your articles, would inevitably create such a disease if it did not already exist. It seems "inappropriate", to use Strawn's word, to apologize for saying what the Bible says, with which everyone agrees. It is "inappropriate" for anyone to ask such a thing. I am sorry that Jeremy gave up his ground, although at least he stood it for awhile, which is more than most will do.

Whether HIV is a "natural consequence" or a miraculous "judgment of God" is not clear from Romans 1:27. I think the Greek leans towards a natural consequence. One of the reasons sodomy ought to be restrained by law, at least in occupations where the state requires stringent sanitation, is for the sake of the innocent people infected with HIV.

There was an amazing case in America's history that established Freedom of the Press. Did you study it in journalism school? In 1735, the governor of New York, appointed by the king, ordered the arrest of political cartoonist and political newspaper publisher John Peter Zenger for publicly ridiculing the governor. He was charged with libel. Zenger's defense was that what he said was true. The judge would not allow him to present evidence to the jury that it was true, because the judge said that was irrelevant. Whether or not it was true, it was still libel.

Had the trial occurred today we would not have freedom of the press, because today the judge would not have allowed the jury to hear the discussion about whether criticisms could be "libel" even if they were true. Today, the judge would declare what the law said, and that was that. The jury would not be allowed to even know there was an issue raised about it.

But fortunately back then, juries heard all the legal arguments, enabling them to judge the laws as well as the facts, so we have Freedom of the Press. Zenger's Philadelphia lawyer argued to the jury that the truth ought to be a defense against a charge of libel. In other words, any American ought to be free to state the truth.

The censure of Jeremy fuels my concern that we need a modern John Peter Zenger trial, to reestablish what I thought until a few decades ago was settled American law: that evidence that statements are true ought to be a defense against the charge that some immature American has managed to become offended by them.

Remember that Zenger's judge wouldn't let Zenger present evidence that his "libels" against the New York governor were true? How do you suppose he got around that? And how do you suppose a thousand Iowa Jeremies can get around the fact that in public forums like news sources, no Biblequoting Christian is going to be allowed to present Biblical evidence that what he said is no crazier than God?

Zenger's lawyer dealt with this problem in a way which it is my guess became the origin of our modern term "zinger": he said although he was not allowed to prove Zenger was telling the truth, "suppression of the evidence ought always to be taken as the strongest possible evidence."

Anti-gay statements didn't deserve rebuke from GOP, candidate says

Republican state Senate hopeful Dave Leach, who has garnered headlines over the past year due to his close relationship with the man convicted of murdering Kansas abortion provider George Tiller, says the Republican Party of Iowa erred when it denounced a state House candidate who called AIDS a

punishment from God for homosexuality.

Jeremy Walters, who is challenging incumbent Democratic state Rep. Kevin McCarthy of Des Moines in House District 67, last week wrote that when the Bible says homosexuals should be "put to death; their blood shall be upon them," the blood is really AIDS. When the statements were made public they were greeted with outrage by One Iowa, the state's largest LGBT-rights group, anddenounced by Republican Party of Iowa Chairman Matt Strawn. When the party later discovered Walters was scheduled to volunteer at the GOP Iowa State Fair booth, his invitation was rescinded.

Walters eventually apologized for the postings and removed them from Facebook.

Leach, who is running against Democratic state Sen. Matt McCoy in Senate District 31, said Walters statement was "theologically clumsy, but it seemed close enough to Biblical truth to not merit a censure from the Republican Party."

"GOP head Matt Strawn is right in saying HIV does not discriminate; in other words, the fact that someone has HIV by no means proves they got it through sodomy," Leach said in an e-mail to Strawn and The Iowa Independent. "But I don't see that that is what Jeremy said."

Whether the Bible says there is a connection shouldn't matter, he said, since, "everyone knows there is this connection."

(In box:) Everyone knows sodomites suffer [HIV/AIDS] far more than the rest of the population, and that sodomy's practices, which are so embarrassingly unsanitary that you dare not detail them in one of your articles, would inevitably create such a disease if it did not already exist. It seems "inappropriate," to use Strawn's word, to apologize for saying what the Bible says, with which everyone agrees. It is "inappropriate" for anyone to ask such a thing. I am sorry that Jeremy gave up his ground, although at least he stood it for awhile, which is more than most will do.

Leach publishes a newsletter called "Prayer & Action News," which advocates the doctrine of justifiable homicide in the case of abortion doctors. One of its contributors was Scott Roeder, the man convicted of murdering Kansas abortion provider George Tiller last year. Leachdrafted a legal brief on Roeder's behalf arguing the necessity defense, helped organize a fundraiser for his legal fees, regularly attended his murder trial and conducted an in-depth interview with him after his conviction in February. Leach testified as a character witness for Roeder during his sentencing.

In his e-mail to Strawn and The Iowa Independent, Leach said he has "profound regret" about publicly criticizing the state GOP, since: "The party has treated me fairly so far, and I hope that will not end as a result of me saying these things."

"Many times throughout my political life, I have said what, so far as I can determine after careful study, is true, and important, knowing the cost could be loss of dear friendships," Leach wrote. "I have always regretted the cost. I pray it will not be too expensive this time."

Gay-rights group: Disturbing pattern of violent rhetoric emerging in Iowa GOP

Statements by a Republican legislative candidate about AIDS being God's punishment for homosexuality, and a defense of those statements by an anti-abortion activists running for the state Senate, are a disturbing indicator of the state of Republican politics, according to the leader of the state's largest LGBT-rights organization.

Jeremey Walters, who is running for the Iowa House in district 67, sparked outrage when he posted anti-gay statements on his Facebook page. After he was denounced by Republican Party of Iowa Chairman Matt Strawn, Walters apologized and took down the posts. But Dave Leach, a Republican

candidate best known for his close relationship with the man convicted of murdering Kansas abortion provider George Tiller, criticized the GOP for abandoning Walters for simply telling the truth.

"Considering Leach's background and his most recent statements, we're beginning to see a disturbing pattern of Iowa GOP candidates who use violent rhetoric and misinformation as a political weapon," said One Iowa Executive Director Carolyn Jenison. "These remarks fan the flames of bigotry and hatred and they have no place in our civic dialogue."

Leach is running against state Sen. Matt McCoy, who is openly gay. At a recent anti-gay marriage rally in Des Moines, Leach referred to McCoy as "Iowa's chief sodomite." Leach publishes a newsletter called "Prayer & Action News," which advocates the doctrine of justifiable homicide in the case of abortion doctors.

As for Walters, after apologizing and removing the Facebook postings, he did an interview with the liberal blog Think Progress where he said he is still unsure whether AIDS is in fact a punishment from God for homosexuality. On his Facebook page, Walters lamented beingostracized by the Iowa GOP, saying "I am ban from any events that the Republican party puts on, so now what?" In addition to the party rescinding his invitation to volunteer at the GOP booth at the Iowa State Fair, Walters said he is also banned from the Republican Party of Polk County's upcoming event featuring Steve Forbes.

It's been an interesting week for state GOP politics and it all started up on Facebook. House Representative candidate and GOP ticket holder Jeremy Walters started out the week expressing his thoughts on the Bible, homosexuality, and AIDS. More specifically, he believe that AIDS was prophesied in the Bible as God's punishment for gay people, according to what's written in Leviticus (presumably gay men, since lesbians appears to be least likely to catch the disease):

Walters' statements were quickly repudiated by One Iowa's executive director, Carolyn Jenison. "Jeremy Walters' comments are offensive and they have no place in this year's election. We call on the Republican Party of Iowa to denounce Walters' comments immediately. HIV/AIDS is an epidemic that does not discriminate. It's a matter of life and death for many Iowans."

Surprisingly, Matt Strawn, the Republican Party of Iowa's chairman, agreed with Jenisonand issued the following statement: "Mr. Walters' comments are inappropriate and in no way represent the beliefs of the Republican Party of Iowa... HIV/AIDS does not discriminate and our hearts and prayers go out to any Iowa family facing this disease." Within an hour of that statement, Republican Party of Iowa communications director Danielle Plogmann communicated: "We just learned Mr. Walters had previously signed up to work the booth as a Polk County volunteer (at the Iowa State Fair booth)... This is no longer the case."

Within a half-hour of that, despite earlier assertions that the Facebook statements were absolutely never coming down, Walters took down his status updates with the following comment:

I am not against people having a gay lifestyle, and the statements made on Facebook have been taken the wrong way. The statement regarding gay homosexuality was not meant to be offensive and I deeply appologize.

As far as the quote from Bible; I was replying to someone elses post. It should have been posted as a comment on their page, not my Facebook wall. I appologize for the mistake and if this statement offened anyone. Both postings have been removed and these comments do not pertain to my campaign

or the Republican Party of Iowa. My passion is to listen and learn from the people so I can represent them at the statehouse. Everyone makes mistakes, please forgive me.

Now color me surprised, but who'd've thunk that the Iowa GOP, after a year and a half of gay-baiting, would make a positive statement for people with HIV/AIDS or that a Republican candidate could get shamed into half-heartedly apologizing to gay people and admitting that, if elected, he'd actually be representing gay constituents and people who came about them?

Thankfully, my shock was short-lived and reality reared its ugly head. Earlier today, GOP state Senate hopeful, Dave Leach, spoke about against the Republican Party of Iowa for publicly spanking Walters:

Everyone knows sodomites suffer [HIV/AIDS] far more than the rest of the population, and that sodomy's practices, which are so embarrassingly unsanitary that you dare not detail them in one of your articles, would inevitably create such a disease if it did not already exist. It seems "inappropriate," to use Strawn's word, to apologize for saying what the Bible says, with which everyone agrees. It is "inappropriate" for anyone to ask such a thing. I am sorry that Jeremy gave up his ground, although at least he stood it for awhile, which is more than most will do.

Leach found Walters' statements about gay blood and AIDS as God's punishment to be "theologically clumsy, but it seemed close enough to Biblical truth to not merit a censure from the Republican Party."

Maybe it's true that AIDS is actually some sort of blood born disease created on Earth through God's intervention as means for punishing gay men. If true, why aren't lesbians as susceptible to the disease of gay men or straight people? Also, why did it take nearly 2000 years for the disease to really get moving? And how come uninfected gay men cannot infect other uninfected gay men? I've had plenty of opportunities to get infected from my husband and yet 16 years have gone by and we're both still HIV negative. If gay marriage is such an evil institution, you would think that God would have come up with some sort of spontaneous runaround virus by now.

The truth is that AIDS is just a virus that got spread around by a population of men who didn't understand its existence until it was too late. There are a few ways to reduce infection: 1. Remain sexually abstinent. 2. Refrain from sexually risky behaviors and use condoms and other barriers during riskier sexual practices. 3. Assume that your sexual partners are HIV positive until you know better (and then continue with that assumption). 4. Maintain a sexually monogamous relationship with someone that you know if HIV negative. 5. Don't share needles with anyone else.

Nothing is absolute, but nobody is condemned to becoming infected. No matter what they believe about God or gays.

Dr. Laura Schlessinger caught in controversy on-air last week when she repeatedly said the N-word to prove a point – although that point was never made clear – announced this week that by December, she would end the current incarnation of her long-running radio show. In an odd interview with The Hollywood Reporter, she makes mention of going "out to dinner with three friends after Larry King. One of my friends who is gay is sitting there with another friend who is black, and he looks up and says, 'I wonder what the media would do with this? You're with a black guy and a gay guy.' We all laughed, because we all understand what this is really about – censoring a point of view." The good doctor also clarifies she never called homosexuality a "biological error," Schlessinger saying that "gays and lesbians have as much compassion, intelligence, ability, warmth as anybody else, the inability to sexually match up male and female is a biological error. That's it. I didn't say people were a biological error. I said male parts and female parts make babies. I was talking biologically. The interesting thing is that gay groups have made the point that it's not a moral issue, it's a biological issue. I was really supporting their point of view." Schlessinger does not, however, support gay marriage, saying "I just feel marriage is a sacred situation between a man and a woman. But I'm all for domestic partnerships."

Matt Strawn, the Iowa Chairman of the Republican Party censured GOP state House candidate Jeremy Walters for posting comments on his Facebook page that argued AIDS was a Biblical punishment for homosexuality, Strawn adding that the Walters's statement are in no way reflective of the Republican Party and the GOP beliefs and that HIV/AIDS does not discriminate. Walters too, apologized, but Thursday Iowa radio host Jan Mickelson on his WHO-AM program said "For the chairman of the Republican Party to say 'AIDS doesn't discriminate,' well of course it does. It discriminates against people who engage in stupid behaviour." He added that God does not directly punish homosexuals, but that disobeying God's laws or natural law, which "also applies to sexual disorders" are self-enforcing, akin to skydiving without a parachute. When a caller then argued that it is promiscuity that increases the risk of AIDS, and that therefore Mickleson should support legalizing gay marriage, he disagreed, saying the promiscuity "defines the lifestyle," adding that "homosexuality is intrinsically promiscuous, because it violates the design of our bodies. There is no safe way to do that. The marriage license is not relevant to promiscuity amongst the gay population. It is designed to do one thing, and that is to get access to the back pockets of the taxpayers. This is about the Benjamins. Not about the institution."
